A Word from our president, Mike McLean

Visitors to our area and residents alike were invited to this two day challenge. Today the participants began at daybreak with a 500-meter swim in Lake Logan, a 12-mile bike ride through Bethel, and a 5K run to finish the day. Full of "Thank You's", an intermittent stream of bicycles made that turn over a 2 ½ hour time period. I watched the riders as they leaned into the turn, but what really caught my eye was the cars, trucks and residents of Bethel that also passed through this intersection. Deputy Cody of the Haywood County Sheriff's staff and I were there for the event but Bethel was there for living life. Whether going to church or going to see family or going to work in some cases, the residents came respectively with curiosity about the event. Some asked, but all waved. I looked across the valley towards Lake Logan and the mountain range surrounding it, and saw the typical "smoke" for which the Smoky Mountains get their name. The sun was just breaking through the morning fog, and I knew that I was lucky to be in this beautiful part of the world with this community.

Just like our new banner that is being planned for Hwy 276 at Sonoma Road, this area always says to me "Welcome to Bethel".

Rural Preservation – Carol Litchfield, Chair, is inviting everyone to monitor pollinator gardens in their neighborhood and around the county in the coming weeks and let her know when and if they see significant numbers of butterflies. During 2020, butterfly sightings were down from previous years. "I was not seeing many butterflies last month, but during August, I have seen an abundance of Swallowtails," says Carol. Monarch butterflies should be arriving during August with the greatest numbers apparent by mid-September. If you see butterflies, make note of their location and which flowers they were attracted to. In early August, Carol took these photos of a Pipevine Swallowtail on Tall Garden Phlox and a Tiger Swallowtail and Monarch butterfly on Joe-pye-weed.

Historic Preservation — Evelyn Coltman, Chair

Lisa Leatherwood, Administrator of Silver Bluff Villages, met Historic Preservation member, Evelyn Coltman, and Department of Natural and Cultural Resources representatives, Annie McDonald and Jennifer Cathey, at the Pigeon Valley Assisted Living facility for a tour of the historic site to determine if the structure is suited for National Register of Historic Places designation. The history of the location is tied to the "County Home" movement in North Carolina and was originally a location for individuals who found themselves in indigent situations. The bottom floor periodically housed overflow from the penal system. The program was originally established to be a working farm that would provide shelter and food for those housed at the County Home. Over 100 years old, the three-story building is architecturally and historically impressive.

Doug Chambers, Edie Burnette, Carroll Jones, Wendy and J.R. Rogers, and Evelyn Coltman filmed a segment of our *Historic Schools of Bethel* DVD at the Hargrove/Rogers House on Highway #215. The Rogers couple has salvaged a wonderful historic location with plans to restore it with historic integrity. The filming also focused on Hargrove family that has played such a prominent role in Bethel history from the 1800s forward.

Rikki Rogers, member of Piney Grove United Methodist Church in Stamey Cove has provided a history of both the church and the adjacent cemetery. This information adds another layer to our investigation of Bethel Cemeteries that will eventually lead to a website listing of all of the known cemeteries in the Bethel/Cruso region. Carol Litchfield has driven to many of the cemeteries already researched in order to calculate accurate directions.

NCDOT has granted Bethel Rural the right to place signage at Truss Bridge #79, NCs oldest metal truss bridge, located on Lake Logan Road. In 2019, Carroll Jones secured the National Register of Historic Places designation for the bridge; BRCO, government leaders, and community citizens celebrated with a ceremony. Carroll Jones and Evelyn Coltman met to select a location. Carroll created a map, wrote the inscription, and Evelyn submitted the application.

The list of Bethel Writers and Media Contributors listed on our website continues to grow with the addition of the following: Kevin Duffus has received NC Historian of the Year Award, the Edward R. Murrow Award, George Foster Peabody Award, Joel Gradin Award of Excellence in Public Humanities, and World Hunger Media Award presented at the United Nations for his research, film documentaries, books, articles, and documents that focus primarily on the North Carolina coast and Blackbeard. Eric S. Brown is a renowned author in the field of horror and science fiction, having published hundreds of short stories and over 100 books, with his material used for a film. Wanda Mathews Taylor is a former newspaper columnist who has gained local fame, not only for her writing, but also for her acting and directing of plays a HART.

We continue to do upkeep and mowing at the Pigeon Gap Watering Hole atop Waynesville Mountain - thanks to the services of Dave at McCarson's Mowing and Landscaping. This is the site of a crossover stopping point for Bethel residents going over Waynesville Mountain as far back as the 1800s. The Historic Preservation Committee supervised an Eagle Scout project to restore the location and the 1924 historic marker at the site.

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In the early 1900's children could be mailed through the US Postal System?

On January 1, 1913, the US Postal Service began accepting parcels weighing over 4 lbs. The regulations for mailing parcels were somewhat vague and people began "testing" the new service. There have been seven recorded instances of people mailing children between 1913 and 1915. It was cheaper that buying them a train ticket on a passenger train. One Idaho family paid 53 cents for the stamps to put on their five year old daughter's coat and mailed her to her grandparent's house 73 miles away. The longest postal trip for a child was in 1914 when the six year old girl's parents mailed her from Florida to Virginia—720 miles. During World War II, several German Prisoner of War Camps were located in North Carolina?

While none of the camps were located in Haywood County, German POW camps were located in 18 places in North Carolina including Hendersonville and Swannanoa. At the time most people did not know about the POW Camps because the government wanted to keep the program hush-hush to prevent public outcry. According to various accounts, the prisoner's were treated fairly and were used as farmworkers to fill the void created by American able-bodied men who had gone to war. One of the camps in Henderson county is now the site of East Henderson High School in Flat Rock. For more information click on the following link:
